BLACK GOLD?

The first flowing oil well in America, tapped unintentionally in 1818, was considered a nuisance. Martin Beatty was drilling for brine near Monticello, Virginia, when he discovered "the Devil's Far." Since it was useless to him, he let it flow into the Cumberland River, covering the surface for 35 miles. The oil spill ignited and an enormous fire resulted, destroying the salt works and trees along the banks. Some time later, Edwin Drake of the Seneca Oil Co. first tapped petroleum at its source and was the first person to prove that oil existed in underground reservoirs. On August 27, 1859, Seneca drilled the first commercially successful oil well at Titusville, Pennsylvania, in an area known as Oil Creek.

TIP OF THE WEEK

Try freezing stuck-together postage stamps. They'll usually separate easily and still be usable.

EARTHWISE

Many people wash their cars at home to save money and water. But if you use a hose without a shut off valve, you could be running through up to 150 gallons of water. Down at the local sell serve car wash you'll use only 5 to 10 gallons. Or get a shut off valve for the hose and soap up with a bucket and sponge. Using the hose to simply wet down and rinse off will save about 130 gallons of water.



CANTALOUPE SOUP

- 1 ripe cantaloupe, peeled, seeded, and cubed
- 1 quart apricot juice
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- dash ground cloves
- 1 cup sour cream
- sprigs of fresh mint for garnish

In a large pot combine cantaloupe, apricot juice, lemon juice, sugar, and spices. Cover and simmer about 30 minutes. Puree mixture in blender and cool. Beat in sour cream and chill. Serve in chilled bowls garnished with fresh mint.
