MARKET COMMENT: THE MARKET TONE WAS CAUTIOUSLY STEADY. DEMAND WAS MIXED ACROSS THE FULL RANGE AND WAS BEST WHERE FEATURED. SUPPLIES OF ALL WHITE EGG SIZES WERE ADEQUATE OR AVAILABLE, AND BROWN EGG SUPPLIES REMAINED TIGHT. BREAKING STOCK OFFERINGS WERE ADEQUATE FROM REGULAR SOURCES. A EXTRA LARGE .67-.69, LARGE .65-.67, MEDIUM .56-.57.

DAILY NATIONAL GRAIN SUMMARY WHEAT PRICES JUMPED MODERATELY HIGHER FROM CONTINUED VERY GOOD EXPORT DEMAND AND TIGHT WORLD WHEAT STOCKS. GOOD EXPORT SALES THIS WEEK AND A WEEK AGO, PUSHED CORN PRICES HIGHER BUT GOOD CROP CONDITION LIMITED GAINS. SOYBEAN PRICES FELL SLIGHTLY LOWER ON IMPROVED BEAN CROP CONDITION AND INCREASED FARMER SELLING. WHEAT 4 TO 11 CENTS HIGHER. CORN MIXED. SORGHUM 1 TO 2 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS 1 TO 6 CENTS LOWER. VERY GOOD FOREIGN SALES BOOSTED WHEAT PRICES AND INCREASED TIGHTNESS IN WORLD WHEAT STOCKS. EGYPT'S SUBSTANTIAL BID FOR SOFT RED WINTER WHEAT GAVE PRICES A SHOT IN THE ARM. CORN PRICES WERE SLIGHTLY HIGHER, SUPPORTED BY GOOD EXPORT DEMAND AND OPTIMISM FOR ADDITIONAL ORDERS. A HIGHER THAN EXPECTED EXPORT INSPECTION FIGURE RELEASED YESTERDAY ALSO ADDED STRENGTH TO PRICES. CORN CROPS ARE REPORTED TO BE GOOD TO EXCELLENT BY USDA, LIMITING PRICES. RECENT RAINFALL IMPROVED SOYBEAN CROPS AND INCREASED CHANCES FOR A BUMPER CROP. EXPORT DEMAND HAS BEEN VERY LIGHT BUT FARMER SELLING IS ACTIVE.
