only to fifth place.

The contest was established to "stimulate the interest of local people in the exhibits," said Keener.

"I think this might have some appeal to many of the exhibitors," he said. All too often, according to the former dairyman and seed salesman, people bring in their best pumpkins and ignore other items in the barn. They disregard a possible exhibit of 30 ears, or the gallon of shelled corn, or the oats, rye, and other grains that could be potential exhibit winners.

Also, exhibitor numbers have been declining steadily, which is concerning the fair committee.

'For some reason, there are more young people now that have other interests. They are becoming more involved in extracurricular work in school," said Keener.

He said that for those young people planning agricultural careers, they would "do well if they pay heed to what they could learn and accomplish now" by exhibiting in the contest.

Eight sponsors donated \$427 for premium money and to help defray contest costs. The donator names will be recorded on a placard at the contest for all to see.

The annual event will be continued if successful, according to Keener. "There's no reason it shouldn't continue to get better," he said.

Monday, Sept. 19 is entry day, with Tuesday the judging date. The grand slam award will be announced following the completion of all judging. Awards are \$250 for first place, \$100 for first runner-up, and \$50 for the second runner-up.


