## Climb The Ladder Of Success, Take Your Family With You

LOU ANN GOOD Lancaster Farming Staff LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.) -- When Dr. Charles Petty was 10 years old, his family was fragmented.

"That's when I learned the importance of family and the need to balance our lives," said Petty, who since then has spent a lifetime speaking about achieving success at work and at home.

Recently Petty addressed the Northeast Poultry Show where his humorous speech was punctuated with insightful looks at family relationships. "Family relationships affect the bottom line of a business," Petty said. "A person's productivity, creativity, and job satisfaction are directly related to his or her personal life."

According to Petty, people who are having trouble at home cannot concentrate on their work. Failure to get along at home takes its economical toll on the company and on the individual employee through absenteeism, illness, alcohol and drug abuse, extended coffee and lunch breaks, personal telephone calls, depression, anger, affairs, burnout, accidents, mistakes, and resignations.

"If you put nothing into your job, how long do you think you would last at your job?" he asked the audience.

Although people recognize that their failure to put any effort in their job would result in immediate unemployment, they don't seem to comprehend that if they putnothing into their family they will soon end up without a family.

"There are no free lunches. You pay the price," Petty said.

He wants spouses to recognize that refusing to deal with small family problems result in bigger problems.

"Alimony," he said, "is like buying oats for a dead horse."

The best way to eliminate problems at home is to devote time and attention to family members.

"Little things make the difference. Warm words of praise, a touch, a hug. Bonding happens with touch — but do not hug teens in public," he said.

Petty emphasized the need to make time for each individual family member. Group attention is not the same. Avoid lumping children together by saying such comments as "You boys."

While it is important in conversation to balance fact with feeling, there is a time when you should only concentrate on one or the other. For example, in the midst of an argument, deal with feelings because spouting off a list of facts will not elicit a spouse to respond, "Dear, you are so right."

A question one should ask him

or herself is how would you like it

if your spouse acted like you do? Relationships are more important than things, but families fight over things.

Petty said, "You can spend a lifetime of accumulating things and leave them to people you never had time for."

There are no perfect families, Petty said. It's important to establish priorities. Do that and let other things slide. Focus on what you are called to do.

"What you love is what you do." Unfortunately many spouses are worka'holics and forget about priorities.

The health of the nation depends on the health of the family.

For those who make family a priority, Petty said, "When you get to the last rung in your career, turn, and your family is right there beside you. Climb fast, climb hard and high."

Petty attempts to practice what he preaches. He has been married for 30 years and has two children.
