

Equine Workshops Set

CREAMERY (Montgomery Co.) — Dave Duckett, a world renown farrier who is highly recognized for his principles of shoeing that are based on the anatomy and structure of the horse's leg, will present two workshops as part of the continuing series of Penn/Jersey Equine Short Courses.

The short courses, offered through a combined effort of the Rutgers and Penn State cooperative extension programs, are designed to increase knowledge in equine management practices.

The first workshop will be held on November 9, at the Hunterdon County Extension office, Rt. 31,

Flemington, NJ. Back by popular request, Mr. Duckett will repeat the program that was offered in 1993 and will complete a dissection of the hoof and lower leg. During the dissection, Mr. Duckett will discuss the relationship between anatomical structures present and the function of the leg and hoof.

The second workshop will be held on November 10 at the Conference Room of the Walgreen Lehigh Valley Distribution Center, Rt. 512, north of Bethlehem. Duckett will be expanding on his previous presentation by emphasizing the importance of trimming the hoof based on the anatomy

and design of the equine leg. In addition, the effect of hoof balance on movement and performance of the horse will be discussed.

The workshop will begin promptly at 7 p.m. and should conclude by 10:30 p.m. A \$30 registration fee will cover both seminars, handouts, and refreshments. The cost of attending just one workshop is \$20. Children under the age of 18 can register for the two sessions for \$15 or pay \$10 to attend one workshop.

Md. Pleasure Horse Seminar Set

ELLCOTT CITY, Md. — The program for the Maryland Pleasure Horse Seminar has been announced by the Howard County Cooperative Extension Service. Participants have the opportunity to choose three different seminars from the nine offered. In addition, Dr. Thomas Fretz, the new Dean of Agriculture for the University of Maryland, is the keynote speaker. He will discuss his "Visions for the College of Agriculture and Impacts on the Maryland Horse Industry."

The Maryland Pleasure Horse Seminar will be held on Saturday, Dec. 3, at the South Carroll High School on Route 26. Many exhibitors will be on hand to "show and tell" about products and services available to horse owners.

The Program Desk and Exhibits Areas will open at 8:30 a.m. and the seminars begin at 9:15 a.m. and end at 3 p.m.

The seminar choices offer a variety of topics, including the following.

- Dr. James Lewis, a practicing veterinarian, will discuss alternative therapies such as acupuncture, chiropractics, and homeopathy.

- Dr. Martin Furr from the Md-Va Regional College of Veterinary Medicine, will offer two seminars: an advanced session focusing on an equine disease update and a basic topic outlining the needs of a general health plan.

- Two nutrition topics will be presented by Dr. Tim Potter of the University of Connecticut. He will present an advanced topic on nutrition for performance horses and a basic seminar on nutrition-forage first, then the grain.

- Of course, a key component in any feeding program is hay. Dr. Les Cough of the University of Maryland will have hay samples to support his discussion of tips for buying and selecting hay.

- Mary Harcourt, co-author of a book on horse barns, will discuss specific needs for the design and

use of horse barns—large and small. Equine owners are faced with other situations around the barn such as manure disposal.

- Mr. Tom Miller, regional agronomist for the University of Maryland Extension Service, will offer suggestions as he answers the question, is TS the next challenge for horse owners? Whether it is a new barn or other need, financial management for horse operations offers guidance for developing, organizing, and presenting financial records when requesting credit.

Advanced registration is required by Nov. 8. The cost of the entire day, including the seminars, lunch and materials, is only \$15 per person. In addition, daycare is available for children ages one to eight for a small fee.
