Gelbvieh Reports Record Growth

WESTMINSTER, Colo. -According to figures from the American Gelbvieh Association, the Gelbvieh breed set all-time growth records in four key areas during fiscal year 1993-1994. The association reports record expansion in inquiries, memberships, transfers, and cow inventory.

Interest in Gelbvieh cattle continues to soar; inquiries from cattlemen across the country rose 40 percent from 1992-1993. Beef producers from the cattle-rich southern and southeastern states led the movement toward Gelbvieh. Forty-eight percent of the inquiries received in 1993-1994 came from these areas.

Adult memberships increased a record 10 percent and transfers were up 8 percent, when compared to figures from 1992-1993. The total number of cows on

AGA also inventory with increased 8 percent.

Despite continued fluctuations in the marketplace, Gelbvieh registrations held steady in the 1993-1994 fiscal year.

"The numbers demonstrate the practical and expanding role Gelbvieh plays in a continually changing beef industry," said AGA President Alan Albers, Nashville, Kan.

AGA Executive Director Jim Gibb said, "Steady interest and growth in these areas is particularly significant given recent price fluctuations in the industry. More and more cattle producers-both seedstock and commercial-are discovering the advantages of adding Gelbvieh to their programs.'




