Grange Redefines 'Farm Country'

WASHINGTON, D.C. — "Farm country isn't farm country anymore," said Robert E. Barrow, Master of the National Grange, in his opening remarks at the Grange's annual convention in Peoria, Ill., recently.



"Neither the bulk of the nation's farmers nor the bulk of the total value of the nation's agricultural production comes from the traditional farming areas," said Barrow. "It is also time we drop the myth that federal farm programs address the needs of all farmers."

Barrow said, "The success of the 1995 Farm Bill will be measured against the realities of an emerging 21st Century American agricultural landscape rather than the farm production patterns of the past."

He said, "The 1995 Farm Bill should contain specific programs that will provide funding for agriculturally-related business development and job creation. It should also provide funding for research on new uses for agricultural commodities that can become additional tools for rural economic development."

An integral part of the 1995 Farm Bill will be the continuation of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), begun in 1986 as a means of taking 36 million acres of highly erodible farmland out of production. Barrow praised the CRP for its environmental benefits and for boosting water quality.

"Eliminating the CRP would reduce farm income, lower grain prices, increase the government's subsidies and eliminate billions of dollars in conservation benefits," Barrow said. "The CRP is a winner for farmers and the environment and should be continued."
