Also, members were recog-
nized. First place in milk produc-
tion was awarded to Melwood
Farm, Cochranville, for 26,301
pounds of milk, 3.3%, 869 pounds
protein. Second place went to
Dunwood Farm, Oxford, for
24,989 pounds of milk, 3.3%, and
826 pounds protein. Third place
went to Charles J. Moore,
Cochranville, for 24,768 pounds of
milk, 3.1%, and 763 pounds pro-
tein. Low average somatic cell
count first place went to Rodney
Bare, Atglen, for a score of
148,000. Second place went to
Century Oak Farm, Potstown, for
a score of 163,000.

Top three county herd manage-
ment scores were awarded to, first
place, Dunwood Farms, 121
points; Breck-A-De, second, 117
points; and Melwood Farms, third
place, 111 points.

Walt Wurster, Chester DHIA
agent, reminded members of the
upcoming Dairy Day on January 4
at the East Brandywine Fire Hall in
Guthrieville. Included will be
information on stall barns, dry cow
management, raising heifers, and
fine-tuning dairy rations.

N.Y. State Grange Approves Resolutions

CORTLAND, N.Y. — The New
York State Grange is seeking
national ratification of its recent
decision to oppose labeling of
milk produced by cows treated
with the controversial bovine
growth hormone BST.

Scheduled for consideration at
the National Grange session in
Peoria, Ill. later this month, the
resolution was one of dozens
approved during the state Grange's
just-concluded annual session and
it is among 25 that New Yorkers
are forwarding for consideration
at the National Session.

The Grange's position relies on
a federal Food and Drug Adminis-
tration determination that con-
sumers have nothing to fear from
the use of bovine somatotropin.
The organization is also con-
cerned that the labeling of pro-
ducts produced by animals treated
with BST—a naturally occurring
hormone produced by the cow's
pituitary gland—could unneces-
sarily frighten consumers.

National delegates will also
consider:

- a resolution calling for a firm
stand against the proposed removal
of milk from school lunch programs
- a resolution opposing any
possible FmHA decision to turn
over vacant farms, wetlands, or

other lands to the U.S. Fish and
Wildlife Service

- a call to oppose any dumping
or storage of hazardous materials
in underground mines.
 - a resolution to offer Ameri-
can sign language as an option for
the second language requirement
in high schools
 - a resolution calling for con-
sideration of legislation that would
create a national system of elec-
tronic fingerprinting initiatives
 - a call to urge Congress to pre-
serve citizens' rights under the
second amendment
 - a resolution urging federal
agencies to be more aggressive in
their investigations of fraud,
waste, and abuse in the health care
system before any kind of health
care reform is initiated.
 - a resolution calling for a cap
on malpractice suit awards
- "These are among a number of
issues with which the Grange
membership is concerned," said
state Grange Master William S.
Benson Jr. "We believe their
endorsement by National Grange
can help make a difference."
- A rural/fraternal organization,
the New York State Grange has
more than 20,000 members in
about 400 local units across the
state.
