National Dairy Summit Encourages Eastern Milk Producers' Leaders

SYRACUSE, N.Y. — Eastern Milk Producers' newly reorganized board came away from a national dairy summit in Dallas, Texas "determined to take advantage of opportunities in the changes and challenges facing the dairy industry in the months ahead," said Eastern President Lewis Gardner.

Gardner, of Galeton, attended National Milk Producers Federation's Dairy Summit from Nov. 28 to Dec. 1, along with his new slate of officers, who included: vice president Edwin Schoen of Phelps, N.Y.; secretary Jerrel Heatwole of Greenwood, Del.;

treasurer Warren Herklotz of Franklin, N.Y.; assistant secretary-treasurer Larry Allen of Chelsea, Vt.; and at-large executive committee member Gerry Mesick of Castleton, N.Y.

The Federation's annual gathering of dairy cooperatives represented three-quarters of the nation's milk supply, Gardner said.

Recognizing that change is upon us, and that we better adapt were two major themes of the summit, Gardner said.

"As Federation CEO Jim Barr told us in his keynote speech, "Today we stand at the threshold

— one more critical than any we've faced in the recent past," Gardner said.

He said Eastern's board agreed with Barr that, "We must make fundamental decisions about our industry."

With that in mind, Gardner said, "We're looking at seizing opportunities in the changes all around us for the benefit of Northeast dairy farmers.

"National and international markets are impacting us in the Northeast," Gardner said. "Whether it's the General Agreement on Tariff and Trade, better known as GATT, or the upcoming 1995 Farm Bill, we're preparing now for change by working more closely with other cooperatives and dairy organizations to give us combined bargaining power, not to mention greater resources that will allow us to respond to the changing marketplace."

Eastern's president noted that for decades, Congress and the dairy industry itself have been talking about the need for greater unity among dairy organizations. "We're tired of talking about it, "he said. "We're going to reap the benefits of working together with

those organizations who have the same philosophy and forwardlooking thinking as we do."

The board is entering 1995 committed to the goals of working with others to enhance marketing power and return more money to member-farmers, Gardner said.
