Processing schedules were very heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were 1 cent lower at 49 to 60 cents. Trade sentiment was weak and unsettled. In the parts complex, wings were well cleared to short. Breast items were competitively priced and slow to clear. Leg items were irregularly balanced, but generally adequate to fully adequate for current buyer interest.

NEXT YEAR PUSHED WHEAT PRICES HIGHER. CORN PRICES WERE SUPPORTED BY TAIWAN'S ORDER AND REPORTS CHINA HAS BOUGHT 57 MILLION BUSHEL OF CORN OVERNIGHT, KEPT CORN PRICES CLIMBING.
