VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE DEMON-STRATIONS - Throughout the week, vo-ag students will present demonstrations on a wide array of agricultural activities. Through these presentations, students have an opportunity to improve their organization and public presentation skills. WINDOW DISPLAYS - The window display in the Main Lobby will commemorate the involvement of the Farm Show Complex during World War II. The federal government leased the facility in 1942 to train airplane mechanics. By October, the Main Exhibition Building was filled with classrooms, offices, a welding shop and a machine shop. The usual Farm Show was not held in 1943, 1944, 1945 or 1946, although farm organizations still held their annual meetings.

WORLD WAR II: THE PENNSYLVANIA HOME FRONT – Come and explore what the Home Front was like during the Second World War II in this mobile museum parked in the Northwest Lot all week. "Use it up, wear it out, make it do or do without." Farm

SUPREME CHAMPIONS - Selections of the prestigious 1995 Pennsylvania Farm Show Supreme Champions will be made for draft horses, swine, dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep wool breeds and meat breeds after the last breed is judged in each department.

POULTRY EXHIBIT - More than 2,000 bantams, geese, chickens and ducks are expected for judging prior to the public opening of the Farm Show. Over 400 champion birds will then be displayed along the Lower Concourse throughout the week. You will also find the egg display in the poultry area.

RABBIT SHOW & SALE - Sanctioned by the American Rabbit Breeders Association, a one-day rabbit show is held on Saturday morning. Best of breed, best of show, best of variety and youth meat pen animals will be

cooped and on exhibit for the entire week of Farm Show. New this year is a rabbit auction, scheduled for 5 p.m. on Saturday in the Small Arena, featuring youth meat pens.

RECORD PREMIUMS OFFERED - The Pennsylvania State Farm Show is committed to exhibiting the best that Pennsylvania agriculture has to offer. This commitment to attracting top quality agricultural products and livestock is evidenced by another increase in premiums, which now brings the total purse offered to 1995 exhibitors to a record \$228,981.

RODEO - Members of the Pennsylvania High School Rodeo Association will perform for Saturday's afternoon and evening audiences in the Large Arena. The student riders will compete for separate points in each sanctioned show, with classes in team roping, saddle and bareback riding, bull riding, steer wrestling, calf roping, breakaway roping, goat tying, pole bending and barrel racing.

SCOOPERBOWL SUNDAY - For a \$3 contribution to the Four Diamonds Foundation, Sunday visitors can enter the Scooperbowl Arena and eat as much ice cream as they like. Several vendors will be serving their ice cream favorites between 11 a.m. and 5 p.m. to raise money for children with cancer. A media contest at 1 p.m. features several teams and their favorite recipes in an ice cream making contest.

SHAVER'S CREEK ENVIRONMENTAL

CENTER - See birds of prey, turtles, snakes, spiders, toads, honeybees, skulls and skins in this educational display geared toward children. This "see and touch" exhibit is scheduled all week in the Family Corner on the second floor of the Northeast Building.
