LOOKS AS THOUGH IMPROVED EXPORT SALES OFFERED SLIGHT STRENGTH TO GRAIN AND SOYBEAN PRICES, AHEAD OF TOMORROW'S USDA CROP REPORTS. WHEAT MOSTLY 1 CENT HIGHER. CORN 1 TO 2 CENTS HIGHER. SORGHUM 1 TO 6 CENTS HIGHER. SOYBEANS MIXED. GOOD EXPORT DEMAND FOR WHEAT TODAY WITH CHINA A MAJOR PLAYER AGAIN. EGYPT AND PAKISTAN ARE STILL EXPECTED TO BID SOON FOR U.S. WHEAT. CORN PRICES ALSO RECEIVED LIGHT SUPPORT FROM TAIWAN'S MODEST ORDER AND FUND BUYING ON THE BOARD AHEAD OF TOMORROW'S GOVERNMENT REPORTS. FARMER SELLING SLOWED DOWN. SOYBEAN PRICES WERE MIXED BUT SLIGHT GAINS WERE NOTED DUE TO IMPROVED EXPORT SALES AND STRONGER OIL PRICES.

OKLAHOMA NATIONAL STOCKYARDS WEEKLY CATTLE SUMMARY

Compared to last week: Feeder cattle and calves steady to \$1.00 higher. Trade active with good demand for all classes and grades thruout the trading period. Large supply of feeder cattle off wheat and fairly large numbers of 500-700 lb. stockers. Quality average to attractive, modest end plain. Weigh conditions gaunt to moderately full and mostly attractive to buyers. Feeders off wheat starting to show signs of great grazing conditions as they are in medium to moderately fleshy condition, with end fleshy. Middle weight cattle varied from thin to slightly fleshy condition. Slaughter cows steady to \$1.00 higher. Slaughter bulls steady. Slaughter demand moderate with exception of good demand for thin cows. Total of 647 cows and bulls sold with 45 percent to packers. Weather has turned beautiful following last weeks cold spell. Days above 50 degrees with nights in mid 30's and 40's. Receipts this week 16,350; last week 3,238; last year 13,578. Supply consisted of 68 percent yearlings over 600 lbs.; 28 percent calves under 600 lbs.; 4 percent cows and bulls. Prices follow with weighted average weight and price in parenthesis.
