Grain Marketing Meetings Set

NEWARK, Del. — The University of Delaware and Delaware State University Cooperative Extension are sponsoring grain marketing meetings in Kent and New Castle counties.

These meetings will be held twice each day, from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. in the Kent County extension office, Route 13, Dover, and from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. in the UD Fischer Greenhouse Laboratory on South College Avenue in Newark.

Following is a schedule of dates and topics:

- Feb. 1—understanding and using basis in grain marketing.
- Feb. 15—cash marketing, including spot prices, deferred delivery, deferred payment, basis contract, no price established or storage contract, and minimum price contract.
- March 2—the use of futures (hedging) to forward-price grain or soybeans.
- March 15—grain merchants panel discussion, developing a marketing plan, and using on-farm storage.

Farmland

Sells For \$736,700

LITITZ (Lancaster Co.) — More than 120 people gathered last week during a sale of two parcels of the Walter Carpenter Farm in Warwick Township, totalling a little more than 97 acres, which brought a total of \$736,700.

The auction, conducted by E.M. Murry Associates, Lititz, included 89.57 acres of farmland and a 7.5-acre parcel, both of which front East Woods Drive. A farm house, barn, and outbuildings were included in the sale.

The 89.57-acre tract was sold for \$545,000 to Wayne Seachrist, Pierson Road, Lititz, according to a spokesman for E.M. Murry Associates.

The other tract totalling 7.5 acres was sold to John Hartz, Woods Rd., Lititz, for \$191,700. The tract of land was advertised as having development possibilities.
