

# Pork Expo Wednesday At Lebanon Fairgrounds

duction," said Abe Fisher, president of the Pennsylvania Pork Producers Council (PPPC), sponsor of the Expo. Registration is free of charge.

Fisher said the new site provides more exhibit space over the Penn Harris. In turn, 80 exhibit booths have been sold as of presstime — "more than we've ever had," said Fisher.

"We hope the site proves to be much better for those who register for the Expo," said Fisher. More than 400 will attend the annual event, which features a trade show and educational seminars for producers.

Featured at the Expo will be Dr. Kirk Clark, nationally recognized for his work with medicated early weaning programs at Purdue University. He will speak about the benefits of multiple site production.

Gary Maas, president of Agri Careers in Massena, Iowa, will provide tips on keeping top-notch employees. "Maas is the top guy in the country with his expertise regarding managing ag employees," said Fisher.

Tom Congelton, marketing manager for the Central Kentucky Hog Marketing Association in Springfield, Ky., will provide his perspective on establishing a marketing network.

Also, H. Louis Moore, Penn State professor of agricultural eco-



nomics, will provide his annual hog market outlook. Dennis Zimmerman, a producer and member of the Nutrient Management Advisory Board, will discuss the state's Nutrient Management Law and how it will affect individual operations.

An annual event is the Keystone Pork Bowl, where county teams compete. Also on schedule is the junior public speaking contest, where you from ages 8-19 compete.

"We try to provide a variety of themes," said Fisher. Included in this issue of *Lancaster Farming* is the complete schedule.

Also, the fourth annual Legislative Activity Fund Auction will be

held following the educational seminars. Fisher said, as of presstime, there were about \$14,000-\$15,000 worth of items, from quilts and prints to mycoplasma vaccines, to raise funds for the PPPC.

Fisher said that volunteer help allows the PPPC to manage and coordinate the activities of the Expo.

Fisher noted that "The Other Burger" will be sold at dinnertime.

## MMI Holds

### Reorganization Meeting

STRONGSVILLE, Ohio — The board of directors of Milk Marketing Inc. (MMI), based on Strongsville, Ohio, held its annual reorganizational meeting recently and re-elected Herman Brubaker, of West Alexandria, Ohio, as its chairman and president of the board.

MMI is a regional cooperative ranked seventh in size in the nation, with 5,600 dairy cooperators in Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Kentucky, Maryland, Michigan, New York, and West Virginia. Last year it marketed and processed more than 4.75 billion pounds of milk for revenues of \$725 million.

The board of directors consists of 21 district directors and three at-large directors. Annual elections are held on a rotating basis.

Brubaker has served as president of MMI since 1985 and presides over all meetings of the board and 210-member delegate body. The board sets policy and direction for the association.

Elected as vice chairs were Pennsylvanians George Bancroft Jr., of Centerville, and Tom Croner, of Berlin.

Dale Kauffman, of Shreve, Ohio, was reelected secretary. Phillip Hart, of Clayton, Mich., was elected as treasurer.

In earlier board elections, dairy producers in 11 of MMI's 21 districts elected to two year terms
