## Neb. Farmers To Head NCGA, NCDF







#### NCGA, **Ethanol Coalition** Receive **Federal Funds**

ST. LOUIS, Mo. -The National Corn **Growers Association** (NCGA) announced that the joint E-85 promotion vehicle project being coordinated with the Governors' Ethanol Coalition has received a federal grant \$162,000 from the U.S. Department of Energy (DoE).

Last fall, NCGA and Governors' Ethanol Coalition joined forces in an effort to coordinate marketing, promotional and development activities regarding the use of high blends of ethanol. The use of ethanol at levels of 70 to 85 percent alcohol is limited to vehicles being manufactured by Ford Motor Company. Such Alternative Fuel Vehicles are being acquired by federal and state governments, private fleet operation, and individuals in a effort to improve air quality, reduce the importation of foreign oil and promote rural economic development.

"The increased use of high concentrations of ethanol for venicle application offers a tremendous opportunity to increase demand for corn," said Rod Gangwish, president of NCGA and a Shelton, Neb. corn grower. "Federal laws and a recognition that our nation's demand for fossil fuels is harmful to our domestic economy, is a driving force to increase the use of renewable fuels to power motor vehicles. Ethanol derived from corn is an extremely


