 Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds slowed slightly, but was generally good and sufficient to keep offerings in good balance to well cleared. Live supplies were moderate; weights were mostly light to desirable. Processing schedules remained very heavy despite some individual curtailment, mainly due to light weights. Less than trucklot asking prices were 1 cent higher at 51 to 62 cents. Trade sentiment was steady to firm, cautious at several plants. Boneless skinless breasts were in fairly good balance. Whole breasts were adequate for a slower call. Leg quarters were in good balance. Wings were irregularly available.

 Daily National Grain Summary
 Cash wheat prices finished mixed, lower on light export demand and slightly higher in Kansas City due to indications that Sri Lanka and Tunisia could be in the market for wheat soon. Slight gains were made in corn pits from carryover export strength. Soybean prices moved slightly lower in sympathy with continued falling soybean meal prices and light profit taking on the board. Wheat mixed. Corn unchanged to 1 cent higher. Sorghum 1 to 3 cents lower. Soybeans unchanged to 1 cent lower. Wheat prices finished mixed with most

traders rolling basis over to May contracts. Export demand has been slow for wheat this week and China's continued absence remains a negative factor. However, reports that Sri Lanka and Tunisia are seeking U.S. wheat, offered light support. Corn prices inched higher again today, supported by recent good export sales and light farmer selling. Light fund buying on the board added some strength. Minneapolis corn and soybeans re-entered the market today but bids are on buyers call and delivery depends on the opening of barge traffic, approximately 20 to 25 days away. Weakness in soybean pits a reaction to the expected record crop in Brazil as harvest is reported to resume any day and weaker soy meal demand. Tight farmer holding of beans also added pressure to prices. Soy oil prices firmed, limiting price losses.
