## **Bull Sale Set**

STATE COLLEGE (Centre Co.) — The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture's Meat Animal Evaluation Center is making final preparations for Pennsylvania's 22nd annual Performance Tested Bull Sale, scheduled for Friday, March 31 at noon in the Penn State University's Ag Arena.

The sale is to be followed this year by the Pennsylvania Cattleman's Association annual ban-

The following day, Saturday, April 1, there is an educational symposium scheduled. In the morning, there will be a variety of breakout sessions to provide information for producers withh a wide range of interests.

In the afternoon program, a cattlemen's production workshop with audience participation is planned. Topics such as castration, implanting, condition scoring, handling vaccines, and nutritional needs of animals through the year among others will be covered.

A very good group of bulls is on test this year. The group consists of 32 Polled Herefords, 22 Angus, 2 Red Angus, 15 Simmentals, two Charolais, one Limousin, and one Beefmaster. These bulls have had their performance already measured through 84 days. They completed their 112-day testing period on Feb. 28.

The top-gaining bull over all breeds so far is the April 9 born Simmental bull co-owned by Shoemaker Simmentals and Marshall Simmentals. This Holleys By the Numbers son has gained 5.83 pounds per day and maintained a lifetime weight per day of age of 4.27 pounds per day. The second-fastest gaining bull is the topgaining Angus bull owned by Diamond D.L. Cattle. This R & J Prospector 341 son has maintained a 5.23 pounds per day gain through 84 days. The top-gaining polled Hereford bull is gaining 4.52 pounds per day. This FPP First Priority 28 U. son is owned by Meadowview Farm.

The entire group of bulls is performing very well. So far, 28 bulls

are still gaining in excess of four pounds per day. Penn State has growth bulls as well as calving ease bulls. Most of the bulls are becoming more moderate in frame size and carrying more thickness.

A delegation of about 200 farmers, members of county farm bureau national legislative committees, will visit their congressmen to discuss Farm Bureau's position on key issues affecting agriculture.

Among the issues to be discussed during Pennsylvania Farm Bureau's annual Washington Tour will be the following: 1995 Farm Bill, Clean Water Act/Wetlands Reform, Regulatory Reform, Health Insurance Tax Deduction, Property Rights, Property Rights, and Capital Gains/Estate Taxes.

of each session.

The morning started off with each producer explaining their operation and how it is designed.

Kreider, for example, said he is starting a seasonal dairying strategy, which means that for about three months out of the year, he intends to not milk cows.

Kreider said he intends to not milk during the hotest part of the year, and to have his herd freshen in the fall, and take advantage of spring growth of forages and small grains to supplement feed. However, he said that he did not intend to use grazing too much in his program, as he wanted to have tight control of the nutrients going into his milking animals.

Dale Hershey and his brother have been featured in Lancaster Farming for their expansion within the past five years. The two have approached dairying as a business and depend heavily upon their computer records to manage the

business. They also milk three times per day in a double-eight herringbone parlor.

The brothers have also make distinct separations of responsibility within the farm and each specializes to a good degree.

Tom Barely is in his second year as a dairy producer, in partnership with a brother and cousin. They milk 75 cows three times daily in a tie-stall barn.

Steve Hershey is an independent producer and family farmer who overall appears to practice more traditional production techniques, but who also uses BST, prostaglandin and a totally mixed ration.

The producers were asked to serve on the panel because each has experienced a measure of success, and because each represents a different strategy toward dairy production.

Topics covered ranged to tunnel ventilation, BST use, feeding, and management decision-making.

#### Forms To Support Association **Composting**

UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.)—A statewide steering committee composed of representatives of composting companies, producers of organic material used in composting, reserchers, educators, agricultural producers, and industry consultants and suppliers has formed the Pennsylvania Composting Association

Serving as the association's interim chairman is Daniel J. Eichenlaub, president of AgRecycle'Inc. in Pittsburgh.

The association will work with the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources and the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture to oversee efforts to create a legislative and regulatory climate that supports composting as a responsible business venture.

PACA's objectives are to create a cooperative atmosphere among industries and organizations interested in composting; to enhance public and market acceptance of composting processes and products; to encourage the use of science-based processes, product standards, and guidelines; and to coordinate efforts with other state, regional, and national organiza-

The association has unanimously adopted a set of bylaws and will move toward incorporation as a non-profit organization as soon as possible. The current steering committee will serve as an interim board of directors until nomina-

tions and elections can be conducted later this year. Categories of membership also were approved, and a membership recruitment drive will begin shortly.

The steering committee was formed in June 1994, following a forum on commercial composting in Pennsylvania hosted by Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences. The committee's first task was to prepare and present testimony on proposed revisions to Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Resources regulations.
