The U.S. dollar showed a slight improvement on today's market and added some pressure to grain and soybean prices. Declines were limited, however, due to improved export outlook. Wheat 2 to 3 cents lower. Corn mixed, mostly unchanged to 3 cents higher. Sorghum unchanged to 1 cent lower. Soybeans 4 to 7 cents lower. Wheat prices moved lower in reaction to a stronger U.S. dollar. However, today's EEP wheat sale to China, the reported 1.1 million bushels of wheat allocated to China and indications 4.8 million bushels were sold to Japan, kept prices from falling too far. New crop wheat condition is good and recent snowcover is beneficial to growth. Com prices were mixed with some weakness stemming from the higher U.S. dollar and light profit taking noted after yesterday's price strength. However, the uncertainty over this years com production and improved export demand, offered some support to corn prices. Weaker Soybean meal and oil demand and the improved U.S. dollar value, erased most of yesterdays gains in bean




