The \$500 ADADC scholarship was available to former dairy princesses who are pursuing careers in dairy product marketing, dairy manufacturing, home economics,

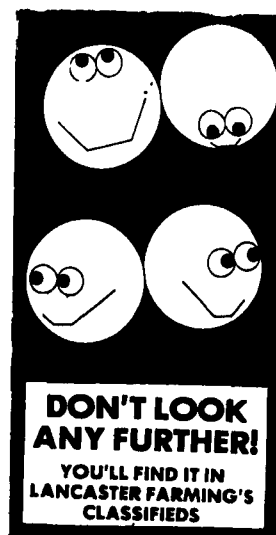

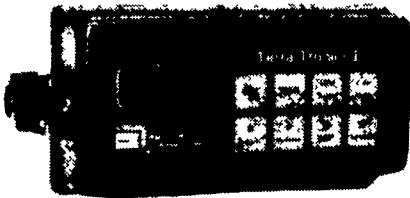

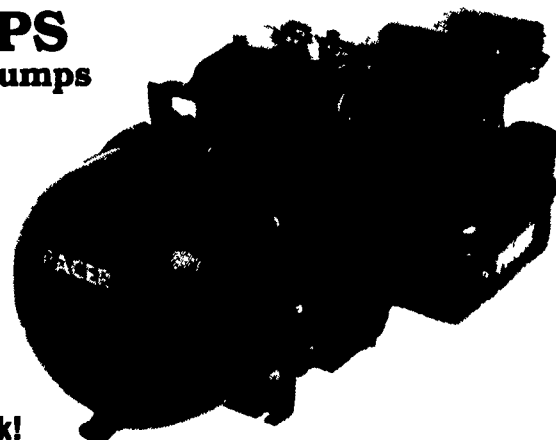
