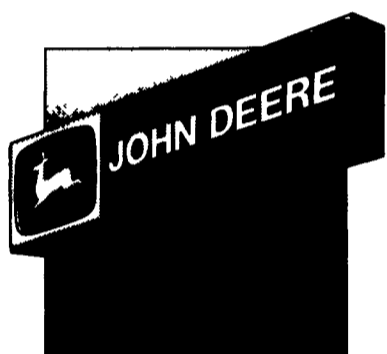

Stacy Krall and Jon Harnish showed the year in review slide. Cheryl Blevins gave remarks from the administration. Awards were

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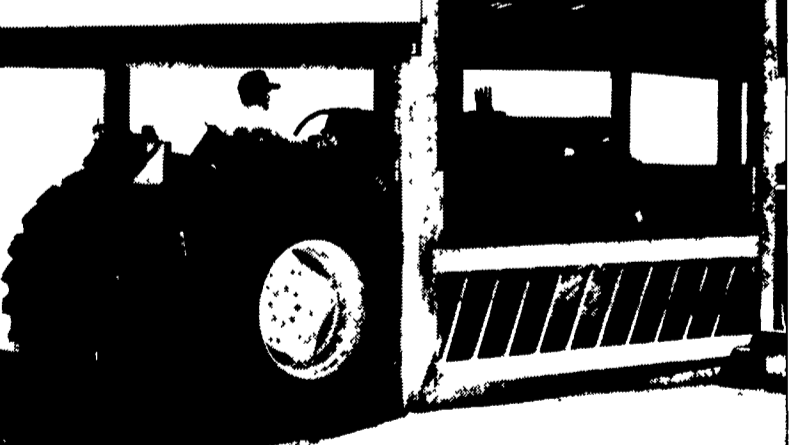
