



Delp Is Moyer President

SOUDERTON (Montgomery Co.)—On April 1, R. Lee Delp, 48, of Lansdale will become president and CEO of Moyer Packing Company. He succeeds Curtis F. Moyer, 71, of Harleysville who will remain active in the business as chairman of the board of directors.

A member of the company's board of directors, Delp is a principal in R L Delp & Company, a management practice working exclusively with CEOs, presidents and owners to build businesses. He spent 20 years with Malvern-based National Liberty Corporation where he rose through management to become senior vice president. Ciba Seeds Receives Registration For Transgenic Corn

GREENSBORO, N.C. — Ciba Seeds (a division of Ciba-Geigy Corporation) was recently granted a limited registration from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for commercial production of corn hybrids genetically engineered for protection against crop pests.

This represents the first time a federal regulatory agency has approved commercial scale production of a transgenic corn crop. However, a registration allowing marketing and sale of the material is still under review at EPA. A decision by EPA regarding full commercial approval is expected

within the next several months.

Commonly referred to as "Bt corn," this particular product is genetically modified for protection against European corn borer, an insect pest that annually costs U.S. corn producers nearly \$1 billion in yield losses.

This grant of registration enables Ciba Seeds, a world leader in crop biotechnology, to produce commercial quantities of transgenic corn on more than 9,000 acres in 1995 for the 1996 growing season. The EPA also granted to Ciba Seeds an Experimental Use Permit (EUP) for research activities on approximately 400 acres during this period.

EPHRATA (Lancaster Co.)—Agriculture dealerships in the area were recently recognized with the John Deere Signature Award Program.

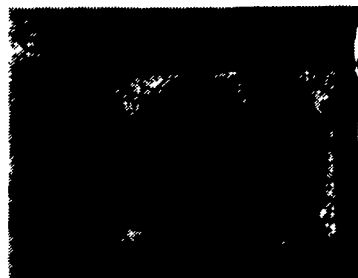
