Daily National Grain Summary Mostly a weather market. Wheat 2 cents lower to 1 cent higher, except Kansas City 5 cents lower. Corn steady to 3 cents higher. Sorghum 1-3 cents higher. Soybeans steady to 3 cents lower. Wheat trade getting a little difference of opinion. Higher one day and lower the next.

Estimates of freeze kill damage to Hard Red Winter Wheat varies considerably. Cold weather not over yet, low temperatures tonight. However, most decline at Kansas City Tuesday was on May which is about to go off the Board and start delivery or settlement. Cold wet weather continues to delay Spring wheat planting. Price spread getting wider on wheat as the higher

proteins bring more of a premium. Corn planting time is here for the big production areas. Farmers are sitting in the barns watching the rains. New crop corn bids 4-5 cents below December, around 2.60 a bushel. Wild cotton market, but prices at a very high level. New crop soybean bids, 12-15 below November, and 5.80-5.83 per bushel. Corn and cotton look much better than beans. Continued cold wet or warm dry weather could change all of this in either direction in a blink. Traders keeping their good eye glued to the weather maps.
