Processing schedules remained very heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 51 to 62 cents. Trade sentiment was steady to firm. In the parts complex, breast items were in closer balance but remained at least adequate. Leg items were adequate to closely cleared. Wings continued to move well at most plants.
