Flag etiquette for Memorial Day places the flag at halfstaff until noon, then raised to the peak until it is lowered at


MAGIC FINGERS

1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs

1/2 cup melted butter 2 cups (12 ounces) chocolate chips

1 cup shredded coconut 1 cup chopped walnuts

1 14-ounce can sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated milk)

OK City Feeder Cattle

OKLAHOMA CITY, OK MAY 24, 1995

Weekly Cattle Summary Compared to last Monday: Feeder steers firm to 2.00 higher with full advance over 800 lbs.; feeder heifers steady to 1.00 higher. Few stockers and calves near steady. Demand good for feeders, stockers, and thin calves; demand light to moderate for balance of calves. Flesh condition and quality of supply was improved for buyers but weigh-ups were on sellers side. Flesh condition of feeder cattle was lightmedium thru moderate-flesh with less cattle in heavy flesh than last week. Many feeders were in desireable flesh. Quality average thru attractive, moderate end plain. Weigh-ups average to many full. Wheat is playing out and cattle are making the transition to grass pasture which will complete the change from heavy to light flesh come early June.

Slaughter cows and bulls steady to 1.00 higher. Demand from packers remains fairly good. Total of 496 cows and bulls sold with about 30 percent returning to the country.

Receipts this week 14,350; last week 10,740; last year 13,833.

Supply consisted of 86 percent yearlings over 600 lbs; 11 percent calves under 600 lbs; 3 percent cows and bulls.




