# "Check calcium separation"

Samples taken at different locations in the same feed line at the hopper outlet, the far end of the house and at the return, often show a wide variation in calcium levels. Both excessive levels (which cause hens to back off feed) and low levels --- prevent adequate calcium intake and cause poor shell quality. Oyster shell's specific gravity (0.86) is close to that of a typical layer ration. This helps prevent Ca separation and build up.
