BURN THE FLAG?

In flag etiquette, the proper disposal of a tattered flag is to burn it with dignity. Flag Day, celebrating the adoption of the Stars and Stripes by the Continental Congress in 1777, falls on June 14th, as decreed by Congress in 1949. Other rules of flag etiquette state that a flag should be hoisted briskly, lowered ceremoniously, and generally flown only from sunrise to sunset. In special circumstances, when the flag is flown at night, it should be well lit. Improper uses include any desecration, public burning, or mutilation of the flag. It should not be allowed to touch the ground or dipped to any person or thing, except, customarily, when a ship salutes by dipping its colors.



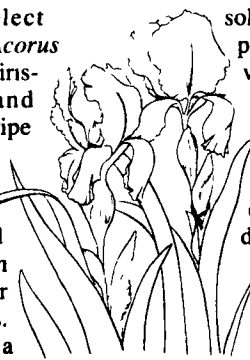

CANDIED SWEET FLAG

Be sure to select sweet flag, *Acorus calamus*, (an iris-type flower) and use only fully ripe sweet flag roots. Clean the roots thoroughly, cut into squares, and boil gently in water to cover for 2 1/2 to 3 hours. Drain. Mix up a



solution of equal parts sugar and water and boil the roots for about 30 minutes until the syrup becomes candied. Drain off syrup, and place roots on wax paper to dry.

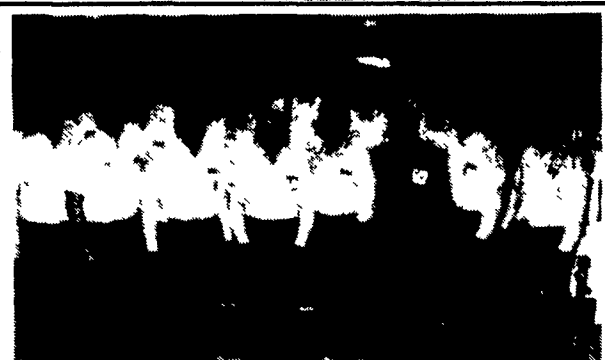

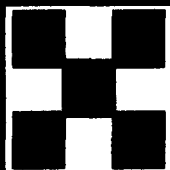
