Frederick County Team Wins Md. Envirothon

ANNAPOLIS, Md.—A team of five students from Middletown High School in Frederick County recently beat out teams from 19 counties to win the 1995 Maryland Envirothon—an intense, hands-on problem-solving natural resources competition for high school students. The event was held May 19-20 at the 4-H Center in Garrett County.

Team members Elaine Bucheimer, Natalie Bucheimer, Crissi Gamache, Jen Morat, and Erin Weber, along with team alternates Lara Wise and Tara Harrell will now go on to represent Maryland at the National Envirothon competition slated for July 31-August 3 in Rexburg, Idaho. The team, dubbed "The Lorax," was coached by science instructor Ron Albaugh and assisted by Barry Burch, a planner with the Frederick and Catoctin Soil Conservation Districts. Some 30 teams from across the nation are expected to compete in the National competition.

"This is a wonderful eduction program for the students," said Maryland Agriculture Secretary Lewis Riley.

"The program is successful because it gets students out of the classroom and into the natural world that they are learning about. It really has an impact on the students to learn about soil from a soil scientist, or forestry from an actual forester.

"It's just a great program all around," he said.

A two-day event, the Maryland Envirothon is held once a year at an outdoor environmental education center. Students taking part in the competition have been studying Maryland's natural resources for the past year in hopes of winning.

Working in teams of five, the students are trained and tested in four natural resources areas including soil, aquatics, forestry, and wildlife, plus a current environmental issue that changes from year to year. This year's issue was groundwater.

The students—who hail from a growing list of Maryland high schools and counties—rotate through the various test stations where they are asked to identify and categorize living resources, perform soil surveys, and solve other complex natural resource issues. The team with the highest cumulative total wins the competition and the opportunity to represent Maryland at the National Envirothon.

At the 1995 competition, the Frederick team scored 433 points out of a possible 500. They were followed by teams from Harford (433 points), Montgomery (395 points), Charles (390 points), Washington (38() points) and Dorchester counties (377 points).

The first Envirothon competition was held in Pennsylvania in 1979. Since then, more than 15 states, Canada, and Australia have embraced the program and sent teams to the National competition in late summer.

Established in 1991, the objectives of the Maryland Envirothon are twofold—to test student's

environmental knowledge and understanding of state resource issues and to instill a desire to learn more about the natural world. Since its inception, the program has grown from 250 students to well over 1,000 students this year. Sixty Maryland schools now participate in the event, up from 42 in 1991. The competition is sponsored by Maryland's Soil Conservation Districts and the State Soil Conservation Committce.



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
