# Pro Ag Members Lobby In Washington

WASHINGTON, D.C.-Several members of the Progressive Agriculture Organization (Pro Ag) spent time in Washington recently, lobbying for the Dairy, Nutrition, and Conservation Act of 1995 (DNCA).

According to Arden Tewksbury, manager of Pro Ag, different teams from the group spent time with officials of Pennsylvania and New York state representatives and senators, explaining the Dairy Act. In addition, aides from 20 other legislator offices were visited.

The entire group met with John Enrich, ag aide for Congressman Joe McDade and Jeff Harrison, ag aide to Congressman Steve Gunderson. Gunderson serves as chairman of the House Subcommittee on Dairy.

They also met with representatives from the offices of Senators Specter, Santorum, Leahy, Jeffords, D'Amato, Moynihan, and Harkin.

Accompanying Tewksbury on the trip were Donald Gregory from Luzerne County, Diana Slater and Joan Lawrence from Susquehanna County, Kirk Rhone from Wayne County, and Sherri Boyanowski Ag. from Wyoming County.

Speaking from Meshoppen, Tewskbury said, "Milk prices paid to area dairy farmers now have plummeted below the 1981 level and will probably go below the 1980 price this summer." It's unthinkable, he said, to ask dairy farmers to continue their dairy operations in this type of economic climate.

The group urged all members of Congress to give serious consideration of the DNCA as a viable method of resolving the financial plight facing dairy farmers.

The DNCA was finalized during the past winter through the efforts of Congressman Bernie Sanders of Vermont, along with the National Family Farm Coalition and Pro

The proposed Act will price milk to dairy farmers based on the national average cost of production, will allow dairy farmers to produce milk in line with the domestic market, will provide milk products for the Dairy Nutritional Program, will further reduce the already low cost dairy programs in the USDA, and will allow dairy farmers to comply with mandated conservation programs.

The Pro Ag members informed everyone they met with, that the amount of dairy products in USDA storage is near an all-time low. Actually, according to officals of Pro Ag, there has been no extra cheese in the United States for three successive years.

According to Tewksbury, diffe-

rent congressional aides informed us that the House Subcommittee on Dairy will start assembling its dairy policy by the end of June.

Dennis Boyanowksi, president of Pro Ag, stated that the organization will accelerate its efforts during the next 30 days in an attempt to have the DNCA considered by Congress.

Pro Ag officials believe it's important for consumers to realize the seriousness of the dairy farmers' plight, and if the consumers want to be sure of a local supply of a fresh wholesome milk, then they must get behind the efforts of the local dairy farmers.
