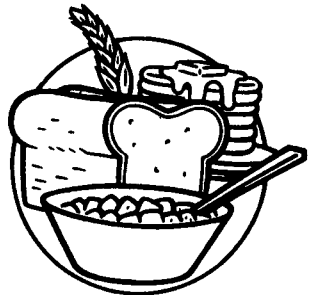
Grain and soybean bids climbed sharply

higher for the second consecutive day, supported by good export demand, fund buying and crop concerns. Wheat 10 to 16 cents higher. Corn 5 to 7 cents higher. Sorghum 9 to 12 cents higher. Soybeans 3 to 10 cents higher. Another day of active fund buying in wheat pits and bids continued sharply higher. Export inspections for the week and year to date were larger than expected. Foreign sales have been good this week with Japan, Egypt, Africa, and The Philippines all in the market. Some weakness was noted due to continued harvest pressure. Corn bids took another giant step forward in reaction to very good export inspection numbers for the year. Taiwan, South Korea and Malaysia have bought substantial amounts of US corn this week. Most of the corn crop is in the ground as "Mother Nature" has been good to us this week. However, some traders are concerned that recent wet conditions could have a negative effect on root development if temperatures begin to climb too high. Stronger soybean meal, oil and corn demand pushed soybean bids sharply higher again today. Additional fund buying on the board was also a plus factor. There hasn't been much in the way of export interest so far this week, limiting gains.

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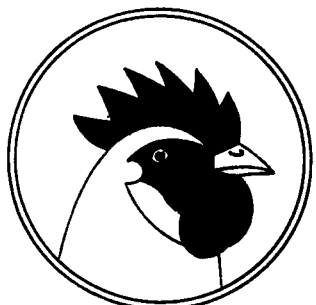
