Check specific gravity of eggs on a regular basis to monitor shell quality. The percent "floaters" and "eggs in transition" in a room temperature solution of 1.08 sp gr is a good bench mark

A 10 gal. bucket, a hydrometer, and an individual egg scale is all the equipment you need. Used with breeder guidelines, this test can help you fine-tune the level of oyster shell needed at each stage in the laying cycle For details on sp. gr. tests and the use of oyster shells,
