uly 23 marks the birthday of the ice-cream cone, born in 1904. Ice cream itself probably derives from Uthe flavored "water ice" of 17th-century Italy. English colonists brought the sweet, frozen delicacy to America, where early settler made ice cream in pewter bowls set in ice and salt. The hand-cranked freezer was

invented around 1846. Jacob Fussel took the process a step further, opening the first commercial ice-cream factory in Baltimore, Maryland, in 1851. The ice-cream soda came along in 1879, and then the ice-cream cone showed up at the World's Fair in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1904. Americans lead the world in their consumption of ice cream, with Australia and Canada close behind.

BAKED ALASKA

1 quart ice cream 1 baked 9-inch layer cake Merinaue:

3 egg whites 1/8 teaspoon cream of tartar 1/4 cup sugar

then refreeze until ready to bake. Preheat oven to 500° F. Bake the Alaska 3 to 5 minutes, just until meringue is light brown. Serve immediately.


