Lessons On Conserving Natural Resources At Ag Progress

ROCKSPRING (Centre Co.) — Seeking informaton on preserving a wetland? Are you wondering how to generate income from your woodlot without harming wildlife? Or are you considering whether composting can be integrated into your farm operation?

You can find answers to these questions and other conservation issues at Penn State's Ag Progress Days, August 15-17.

Buses will depart daily from the Conservation Education Tent on West 11th Street to take visitors on various tours demonstrating conservation techniques.

The stream corridor management tour centers on how stream crossings and streambank fencing can improve natural waterways. Demonstration sites for constructed wetlands also are featured. Buses leave at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

A walking tour concentrating on forestry and wildlife will highlight small woodlot management. Topics such as harvesting trees to generate income, forest regeneration and road and trail maintenance will be addressed. A special demonstration will explain how to use warm-season grasses as a wildlife cover. Buses to the walking trail leave daily every hour starting at 10 a.m.

On the agricultural conservation tour, farm operators can learn how conservation practices can protect soil and improve water quality. Crop residue management, contour stripcropping, cropland terraces, waterways and water diversions will be covered. Demonstrations of a forage chicory pasture and livestock grazing also will be featured. Buses leave daily at 1 p.m.

The on-farm composting tour offers information on recycling manure and other materials. Visitors can see composted farm waste at various stages. Compost will be turned during the 10:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. tours. In addition, finished poultry compost will be shown in a poultry mortality composting bin. Buses leave hourly from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

A variety of conservation education programs also are featured daily in the tent, including "Faces of the Future," a five-minute video that details children's often-humorous opinions about conserva-

youth-oriented slide show that explains conservation practices by comparing, for instance, crop residue management to making a multi-topping pizza.
