Wings were irregularly available and clearing satisfactorily at most plants.

RESORT AREAS CONTINUED TO EXPERIENCE FAIR TO GOOD EGG MOVEMENT. SUPPLIES WERE AT LEAST ADEQUATE AND AVAILABLE, YET SELLERS DID NOT ACCEPT SEVERALY DISCOUNTED PRICES LIKE EARLIER IN THE WEEK. Prices were unchanged to lower in the Northeast and Midwest, unchanged elsewhere. The market tone was cautiously steady to weak, and the large sizes were in the weakest position. Demand into retail channels was light to no better than moderate, and loose egg sales into food service were fair to occasionally good. Supplies of jumbo were tight to adequate, and the balance of sizes were at least adequate and available. Breaking stock supplies were adequate to ample for the light to fair at best demand, and the market tone was barely steady to weak. Light type hen supplies were close to adequate for the mostly moderate demand.
