

Twelve Receive Pa. Farm Women Scholarships

LANCASTER (Lancaster Co.) — Students of home economics and agriculture-related courses received scholarships from the Flora Black Memorial Scholarship Fund presented by the Society of Farm Women of Pennsylvania. Those who received \$1,000 toward their education are Kristin Groff, Lancaster County; Carrie Hetrick, Berks County; Angela Leininger, Lancaster County; Cory Meyers, Franklin County; Bryan Pearson, Cambria County, and Kraig Sellers, Lebanon County.

The Flora Black Memorial Scholarship, named for the founder of the Society of Farm Women of Pennsylvania, was established in 1960 to help educate girls studying home economics. This was changed in 1994 to include daughters and sons of mothers or grandmothers who are society members, studying home economics or agriculture related courses. The fund is supported by sales of a state cookbook.

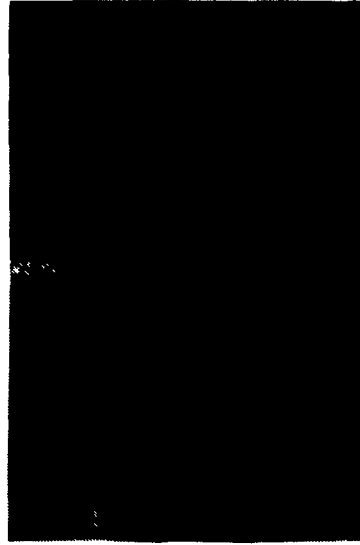
