

Cumberland 4-H Dairy Roundup Winners Named

Food Handler Certification Advisory Board

HARRISBURG (Dauphin Co.)—Agriculture Secretary Charles C. Brosius recently announced the formation of a board to review and recommend food handler certification programs for supervisory personnel in the food and beverage industry.

Such a certification process

would help to ensure that the personnel are properly trained in safe food handling practices.

"This is the first time in history that the department has had the complete responsibility for the safety of food from the farmer's field to the consumer's table," Brosius said. "Food handler certification programs will help provide added protection for consumers with as little regulatory burden on the industry as possible.

As part of a joint effort between department officials and the food industry, legislation was developed to address food handler certification.

Act 131 of 1994, which includes the Food Employee Certification Act, provides for mandatory food handler certification in food establishments by the year 2001.

Food establishments include retail food stores and public eating and drinking places.

The act created the state Food Employee Certification Advisory Board. The board consists of 21 members, appointed by the Agri-

culture Secretary, who serves as chairman.

The board includes representatives of the food industry and related organizations. Board members will serve terms to two, three or four years.

Food establishment employees shall be certified by the department following the completion of industry-specific training programs recommended by the advisory board and approved by the department.

Local regulatory certification

programs established prior to Sept. 1, 1994 may remain in effect.

The initial certification of food handlers will be in effect for five years. Renewal of certification will be based on the attendance of courses recommended by the advisory board and approved by the department.

The board's working groups will continue to examine the certification issue. The next meeting of the full board is scheduled for November.
