Crop concerns, good export lineup, and fund buying pushed wheat bids slightly higher. Com bids fell slightly lower on wet weather reported in parts of the Midwest and a slowdown in export sales. Soybean bids were narrowly mixed with beneficial rains, lack of export demand, and weaker oil and meal added pressure. However, hot weather in most of the Midwest underpinned bids. Wheat 3 to 5 cents higher. Corn 1 to 2 cents lower. Sorghum 2 to 5

cents lower. Soybeans mixed, 1 cent lower to 3 cents higher. Indications that several good export sales are in the making, offered strength to wheat bids. However, nothing has been confirmed at this time. Crop concerns due to hot, humid weather continued to add support to bids. Corn and soybean growing areas received some moisture but hot temperatures continue and rains are far and few between. Traders expect USDA to cut yield estimates in their next reports. Soybean oil and meal demand slipped lower and export sales have been scant this week, especially for soybeans.
