
Dealer Seminar Held For New Products

SMOKETOWN (LANCAS-TER CO.) - "In the Midwest, late weather patterns have corn acres down, but soybean acres are substantially increased," said Jack Tredinnick, executive vice president, AgriPro Seeds, Inc., Shawnee Mission, Kansas. The company official was in town last Friday for a dealer seminar at the P. L Rohrer Bro., Inc., dealership.

"The alfalfa business is exceptionally strong," Tredinnick said. "Our business is excellent. In the short term we need a late frost to get a crop. Long term, agriculture will see more identity preserved products- seeds developed that carry value additions to the end user. The idea that corn is corn and beans are beans is outdated."

In their line of products, Tredinnick noted the new alfalfa lines that are resistant to diseases at the seedling stage. In corn, he said yields are still the name of the game. Farmers need to give some of the new varieties a "look/see" even if they are not familiar with the brand name.

"Our success will be the byproduct of the farmer's success," Tredinnick said. "Here in the East, the biggest competition to acres is development. But in other areas the acres remain the same but are controlled by fewer farmers. The seed industry is consolidating too. This means fewer people are chasing the same market with fewer producers to buy the product. But nothing sells product like product. Salesman can get you on the farm the first time. After that it is up to the product to earn more acres," Tredinnick said. "We have the products to do this."

The training session continued all day. The afternoon program included visits to the field test plots near the dealership.
