

Ohio State Fair Draws 114 Angus Entries

ST. JOSEPH, Mo. — Breeders paraded 88 females and 26 bulls for judge Dale Grubbs, Hillsboro, Ind., at the 1995 Ohio State Fair Angus Show. The event was held Aug. 12 in Columbus.

Top honors in the bull show went to Champion Hill Keystone 819, a March 1994 son of Century Touchstone 131. Broken Lance Ranch, Bucyrus, Kan., and Champion Hill, Bidwell, Ohio, own the entry that was first named the junior champion.

Reserve grand champion bull honors went to the winner in the senior division, C L Doctor Casey. Merlin Woodruff, Urbana, and Masterfare Ltd., Johnstown, exhibited the May 1993 entry sired by Da Es Ro Casey 629.

Champion Hill Sleepy Miss walked away with grand champion honors in the female show. Champion Hill, Bidwell, and Kurt Pfeiffer, Bucyrus, own the February 1994 daughter of G A R Sleep Easy 1009. She first topped the entries in the junior division.

Grubbs selected Champion Hill Cheyenne 818 for his reserve grand champion female. The March 1994 daughter of Century Touchstone 131 was also the reserve junior champion. She is owned by Neenah Hill, Bidwell, and Longaberger Farms, Dresden.

Penn State, Va. Tech Hatch Joint Program

UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.)—Tens of thousands of Pennsylvania school children will have continued opportunities to learn the science of embryology under a joint effort recently hatched by Penn State and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

Under a three-year agreement, Virginia Tech's Department of Animal and Poultry Sciences will provide expertise and educational resources to conduct the 4-H embryology program in classrooms around Pennsylvania. In return, Penn State's College of Agricultural Sciences will help Virginia Tech develop cooperative extension educational programming for commercial turkey growers in the Shenandoah Valley.

The agreement will enable both universities to overcome staffing and funding pressures to maintain and enhance successful extension programs.

"The avian egg is the perfect package for a school project," said Virginia Tech extension poultry specialist Phillip Clauer, who is providing leadership for the joint embryology program.

"It's a high-tech lesson in a short time span," he said. "You start with a fertilized egg, and 21 days later you have a chick. In the meantime, students can easily see the developing embryo by candling or shining a light through the egg. Eggs also can be 'windowed,' allowing the kids to see the membranes, sacs, blood vessels and other structures. Besides being educational, it's a lot of fun."

"Embryology is a useful tool

for teaching youngsters a variety of scientific and other subjects," said Clauer. "By caring for and hatching eggs, children can learn about fertility, fetal development and the responsibility of caring for living organisms."

County-based cooperative extension professionals typically work with local schools to introduce 4-H embryology in the classroom, and arrange for the incubator and fertilized eggs needed for the program.

"About 54,000 youths participate in embryology projects in Pennsylvania each year," said Ben Nolt, coordinator of Penn State Cooperative Extension's 4-H animal programs. "The program reaches young people from all kinds of backgrounds—urban, suburban, and rural."

Under the agreement, Clauer will work with Penn State faculty

and county extension agents to develop, adapt and update materials, such as 4-H member and leader training guides, for use in Pennsylvania. Clauer also will conduct in-service training sessions and help to establish a statewide advisory committee to identify and prioritize program needs.

"In an age of shrinking resources, this kind of joint arrangement is an efficient way of operating," said Nolt. "By sharing and adopting the best of what has worked for others, we can eliminate duplicate efforts and spend more time delivering educational programs."

"We're excited about the possibilities this joint program brings to 4-H embryology in Pennsylvania," Nolt said. "We believe it also could lead to a lot of spin-off benefits for other cooperative extension programs in both states."
