Bronchitis Could Challenge Broiler, Layer Flocks

MANHEIM (Lancaster Co.) —
Poultry companies take heed —
two new strains of viral bronchitis,

recently discovered in Pennsylvania flocks, could pose a challenge to your broiler or layer flocks in the coming months.

The isolates — Arkansas and Delaware 072 — were found present in two separate flocks, located miles apart in Lancaster County, according to Dr. Sherrill Davison, VMD, Poultry Diagnostic Lab at the University of Pennsylvania.

Davison recently spoke to about 30 poultry producers and agri-industry representatives at the Poultry Management and Health Seminar at Kreider's Restaurant.

The respiratory disease, caused by a "coronavirus," is highly contagious, affecting birds anywhere from two days to six weeks with high mortality and condemnations. Symptoms include coughing, sneezing, and snicking — a variety of respiratory problems, according to Davison.

The University has been performing studies in cooperation with two state broiler flocks that have had problems with respiratory-like symptoms. Mortality for one company ranged from 6.2 percent to 22.9 percent, with an average of 12.2 percent. Mortality for the other company (located a distance away) was 3.4 percent to 7.9 percent, with an average of 5.54 percent.

The cause of the bronchitis is uncertain, since flocks located nearby haven't been affected.

Davison said that many companies are getting hit with mortality

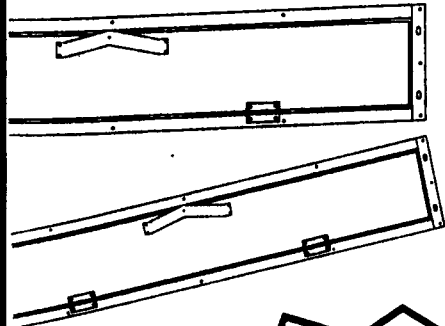
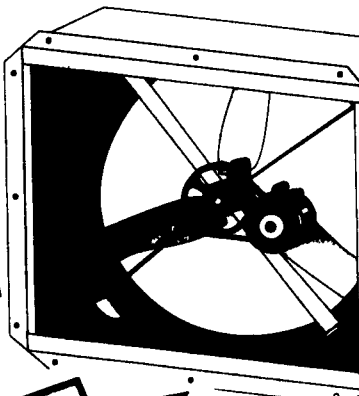
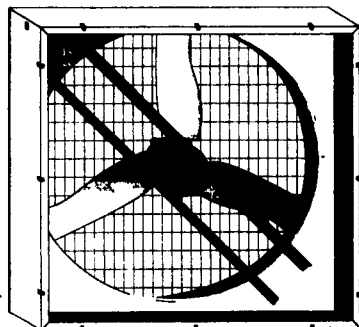
