Trucklot buying interest was sluggish. Offerings were usually fully adequate for the disappointing buyer interest. Movement through retail and distributive channels was light with some out front interest developing at the increasingly competitive price levels. The market tone was generally weak with trade sentiment remaining cautious.

Continued export interest and favorable export outlook kept wheat bids on the rise. Corn and soybean bids were mixed as profit taking continued to push bids lower but improved export demand and expected frost over the weekend limited declines. Wheat steady to 4 cents higher. Corn mostly 1 to 3 cents lower. Sorghum 1 to 2 cents lower. Soybeans mixed from 1 to 3 cents lower to 4 cents higher. Overseas wheat orders continued to show up and indications that Russia may tender for US wheat and flour, added further strength to bids. Fund buying on the board began after reports that Russian officials will meet with the USDA next week to discuss a possible GSM-102 offer for not only wheat but also corn and soybean. Traders spent another day of fund selling in corn and bean pits as frost concerns eased somewhat. Ideas are that the predicted frost may not hit until Saturday, giving crops a couple more days to mature.

Late planted soybeans are still filling pods and a heavy frost would be damaging to beans. Most of the corn is made by now but some damage to late filling ears could cut into yields. Recent good export sales and optimism for additional orders offered some support to bean and corn bids. Export demand: Purchaser Commodity

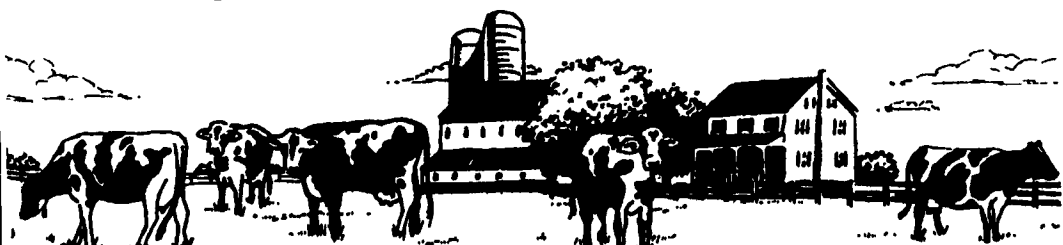
