

Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was slow to fair and best on 3 pound and smaller sizes. Offerings were fully adequate, particularly on the heavier weights. Live supplies were mostly moderate; weights were desirable to often heavier than desired. Processing schedules were very heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 59 to 70 cents. Trade sentiment was no better than steady. In the parts complex, boneless skinless breasts were fully adequate. Bone-in breasts continued to tighten. Leg items were fully adequate to ample. Wings were readily available for a lackluster buyer interest.
