Prices were unchanged to lower for the large sizes in the Northeast, and generally unchanged elsewhere. The market tone was cautiously steady to weak. Demand remained mixed from light to good, mostly fair and best where featured. Supplies of the large sizes were at least adequate in all areas, and the light sizes were generally adequate. Breaking stock supplies were adequate to fully adequate for the light to moderate demand, and prices were about unchanged. Cases of shell eggs broken under federal inspection during September 1995 were 7% lower than last year. Light type hen offerings were generally adequate to instances short in the South for the fair plant needs, and the undertone was steady.

Cash wheat bids finished slightly higher

on fund buying and export optimism. Corn bids were slightly lower due to harvest pressure but good export demand limited declines. Soybean bids gained some strength on good export sales, crop concerns, and improved meal and oil demand. Wheat steady to 3 cents higher. Corn 1 to 2 cents lower.

Sorghum mixed. Soybeans 2 to 5 cents higher. Wheat traded slightly higher on indications that Jordan bought some U.S. wheat overnight but nothing has been confirmed as yet. Fund buying on the board offered some strength and stronger bean trade underpinned bids. Very good export demand for corn and soybean today. However, corn closed slightly lower as active harvest weighed on bids. Bean were supported by improved meal and oil demand and a good overnight sale to Taiwan. Traders concerns over potential crop damage due to hurricane Opal, offered strength to bids. Heavy winds and torrential rains moved into Georgia and Alabama today.
