be the best indicator of potential yield. Individual plants may respond to low plant population by producing more stems per square foot.

Wisconsin research shows that maximum yields are produced with 55 or more stems per square foot. Next spring, after growth starts, return to suspected fields and count the number of stems per square foot. When stems average only 40 per square foot, yields are reduced by 25 percent.

Identification of suspected fields in the fall will save time next spring when things are rushed. Feather Prof.'s Footnote: "Excellence can be yours if you


