Educational materials are also available year-round to educators and producers. These materials are great for farm tours, group presentations, or mailings.

Tammy Balthaser of the Beef Council will share materials and ideas for educating both children and adults in your area about the beef industry. Consumer promotions are vital to increase consumption, but education is equally important because it maintains a positive outlook for the beef industry as a whole.

Beef supplies moved well this summer under an avalanche of marketing promotions, reports the Pennsylvania Beef Council:

A partnership with Wendy's helped the chain move more than
 1.5 million pounds of beef in August and September. Another
 1.5 billion positive beef-buy messages are predicted in the coming year from ceiling banners and

drive-up signs featuring oldfashioned hamburgers at 3,800 Wendy's nationwide.

 An estimated 100 million adults saw 1,000 "Beef It's What's For Dinner" television advertisements aired May through September. The commercials promoted quick easy preparation.

 More than 2,000 food-service sector requests for beef recipes resulted from a February through October campaign.

• An estimated 6 million women saw televised beef advertisements during the Sept. 16 Miss America pageant.

• Readers of national women's and parent's magazines found beef-meal ideas featured all summer, and more than 500,000 "30 meals in 30 minutes" recipe books were given to consumers May through September.

• In May dairy-partnership program, grocery stores gave 55 cents off coupons for ground beef to almost 14 million consumers.


