Choosing The Right Childcare Program

UNIVERSITY PARK (Centre Co.)—An important decision for working parents to make is selecting the right child care provider. Parents need to keep in mind that they are hiring a "substitute parent" to spend a large portion of

each day with their child. A child care provider becomes a major figure in a child's life. At times the provider spends more "awake" time with the child than the parent.

Children are important. Choosing child care is a major decision. Consumers often spend less time to buy a service like child care than they do to buy a car, t.v., or washing machine. When it comes to selecting child care, many parents sign up for the first empty spot. Sometimes, the whole arrangement takes place over the telephone.

Parents first need to decide which type of care they prefer for their child. State regulated programs include: child care centersseven or more children; group child care homes—allow a total of twelve children; family child care homes—up to six unrelated children; and nursery schools—usually part-time programs.

The second step is to visit several centers or homes and interview the staff. Questions need to be asked about types of activities, schedules, how discipline is handled, and if independence is promoted.

A parent needs to look around carefully for cleanliness. Safety issues should be checked. Is there a first aid kit? Are emergency telephone numbers posted? Are cleaning materials and medicines kept in locked cabinets?

Find out if parents are welcome to visit. What are the payment policies and how are vacation or sick days handhar? These are just a few of the questions to be asked.

Several centers or homes should be checked out thoroughly to find the best one for the child.
