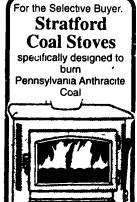

The \$3.4 million premium paid in September was equivalent to 9 cents per hundredweight.

This payment, along with equity, quality and over-order premiums of nearly \$18 million, boosted member earnings 53 cents per hundred.

The cooperative added 600 new members and marketed 4.54 billion pounds of milk. Dever noted that ADC exported more product than ever before through the Holly plant. Atlantic has farm members in Pennsylva-nia, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, and West Virginia.



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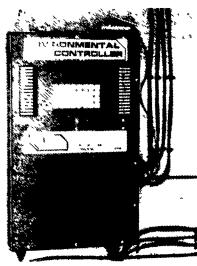
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
