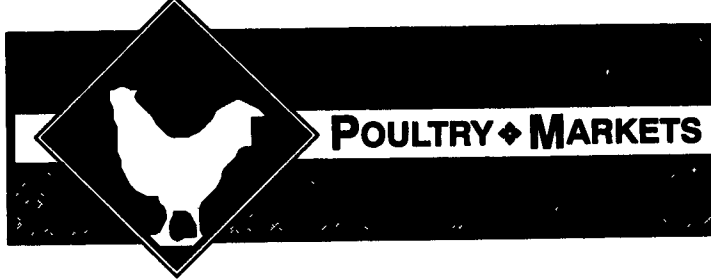

Movement of ready-to-cook whole birds was slow to moderate at best. Offerings were fully adequate to ample and extra product was difficult to place. Live supplies were moderate to heavy; weights varied from light to heavy and were mostly desirable to heavy. Processing schedules were very heavy. Less than trucklot asking prices were unchanged at 56 to 67 cents. Trade sentiment was barely steady. In the parts complex, all items were at least adequate for prompt shipment. Leg items and wings were in the closer balance at most plants.

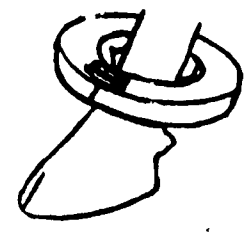

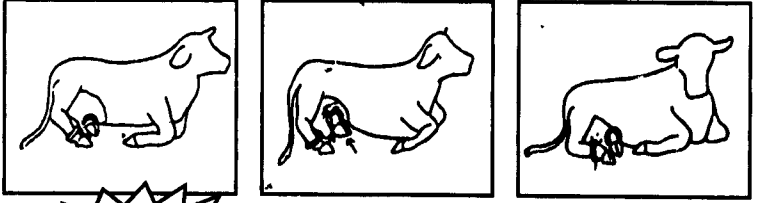
