Midwestern Governors Call For Voluntary Plans

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Five Midwestern governors called on Congress to include voluntary agricultural resource management plans (VARMPs) in the 1995 Farm Bill.

"Regulatory reform and voluntary compliance are inherent in voluntary agricultural resource management plans," Governors Jim Edgar (R-IL), Terry E. Branstadt (R-IA), Arne H. Carlson (R-MN), George V. Voinovich

(R-OH), and Tommy G. Thompson (R-WI) said in a letter to members of Congress. "[W]e encourage you to explore this integrated, site-specific approach to enhanced environmental stewardship."

The purpose of VARMPs is to provide the educational component which leads to the technical and financial investment to encourage the enhancement of environmental stewardship. These

plans are to be farmer- and rancher-owned, controlled, developed and implemented. Federal and state agencies should not be placed in a position to direct or mandate the contents of these plans — to do so assures this positive approach to environmental enhancement will fail. Farmers and ranchers should voluntarily make the decisions on how to protect their natural resources, not federal or state governments.

Farmers and ranchers clearly support congressional efforts to offer them incentives rather than mandates to allow them to voluntarily manage their land and balance their economic needs with their land's environmental needs. Data recently released by NASDA showed that 74 percent of 1,200 farmers and ranchers surveyed in Indiana, Iowa, Kansas and Mississippi believed it was important to include the VARMP concept in the 1995 Farm Bill.
