Pineapple Supreme

- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- ½ cup cold water
- 1 tablespoon pure lemon juice
- 9-ounce can crushed pineapple, undrained
- 2 3-ounce packages cream cheese

Sprinkle gelatin over water in a small saucepan. Dissolve over medium heat, stirring constantly. Stir in lemon juice. In a blender, liquify pineapple with half the cream cheese. When completely blended, add the remaining cream cheese and liquid.

Sugarless Apple Pie

- 6 medium sliced Delicious apples
- 1 6-ounce can frozen apple juice
- Combine apples and juice and cook for 5 minutes. Dissolve:
 - 1½ tablespoon cornstarch
 - 1/3 cup wate

Stir into apple mixture. Bring to a boil and boil for a few minutes until soft and thick. Stir in 1 teaspoon cinnamon.

Fill pie shell with apple mixture. Add a top crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Baste with melted butter after baking.

Bee Sting Cake

Batter:

- 2 eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 2 tablespoons butter
- ½ cup milk

Topping:

- 10 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1/4 cup heavy cream
- 1 cup shredded coconut
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Grease an 8x8-inch pan. Mix together eggs, sugar, vanilla, flour, and baking powder. Bring milk and butter to a boil and mix with batter mixture. Pour into prepared pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Mix topping and spread over cake while still warm. Broil until bubbly and brown. Serves 10.

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
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
