

The cleanliness of the barnyard, feed areas, and manure management are other aspects of the farm operation taken into consideration. Roadside judging is conducted during the month of May. Former winners of past years are also rejudged to ensure they continue to meet standards of excellence.

To qualify for consideration, you must be actively dairy farming and shipping milk. Applications are available from your state secretary.
